

Election Impacts: President Trump

- Strict 2 year enforcement on funding from Federal Highways Administration
- MedicAid/ MediCal waivers eliminated. Could lead to reduced funding for Behavioral Health and Homeless Services.







Election Impacts: Measure Q, Water and Wildfire Protection Act


Passed - 58.9%

Will raise approximately \$7.5 million per year

- 40% distributed via grants
- 20% to cities
- 20% to the County
- 20% to RCD and a local land stewardship partner

"Eligible projects include those focusing on ...

development of shaded fuel breaks and
reduction of hazardous fuels, forest
management ..."



Next Steps


- Required to write a strategic plan
- Create a commission in 2025
- Likely to start taking grant applications in January 2026



County Fire - CSA 48 Update


- The current Amador Contract with CalFire needs to be renegotiated.
- There are 12 fire districts within the County
- Small fire districts are struggling (including Pajaro Valley FPD and Felton FPD) due to higher costs and less volunteers.

Next Steps

- Fire Department Advisory
 Committee dissolved.
- County and LAFCO are developing a reorganization plan for CSA 48
- Goals:
 - 1. 24/7 staffing at 3 stations
 - 2. Improved accountability
 - 3. Structure that can handle future mergers.



Road Funding

- \$7 million in new funding from Measure K
 - \$4 million allocated to contingencies for emergency repairs this winter, may be directed to permanent road repairs in the spring.
- Schulties repair completed
- Stetson permanent repairs postponed till the Spring due to permits and bid 2x higher than estimate













- Met with Santa Cruz County legislators, as well as those representing Yolo, Orange, San Bernardino, Sacramento
- Reviewing school funding implications with School Districts
