AB109 Request for Proposals (RFP) 2024-25

Procurement Process

The Request for Proposals (RFP) was approved by the Board of Supervisors and released on February 13, 2024. Twenty-eight proposals were submitted across seven major service categories.

Proposals were reviewed and scored by a trained panel of 20 individuals representing law enforcement, the courts, probation, county departments, and community-based organizations. Proposals in each area were ranked based on their average reviewer scores.

The panel rankings will be presented for approval by the Board of Supervisors on June 25, 2024. We now request that the CCP review the rankings and recommend Board approval.

Introduction

On February 1, 2024 we celebrated the grand opening of the Santa Cruz County Sobering Center. Situated on Water Street, just in front of the Santa Cruz County Main Jail, this facility offers a valuable alternative for individuals arrested for first-time DUI, public intoxication, and those under the influence of drugs/alcohol. Rather than being taken to the main jail, eligible individuals will be taken to the Sobering Center. This facilitates immediate connections to treatment for clients and expedites the return of law enforcement back to community safety.

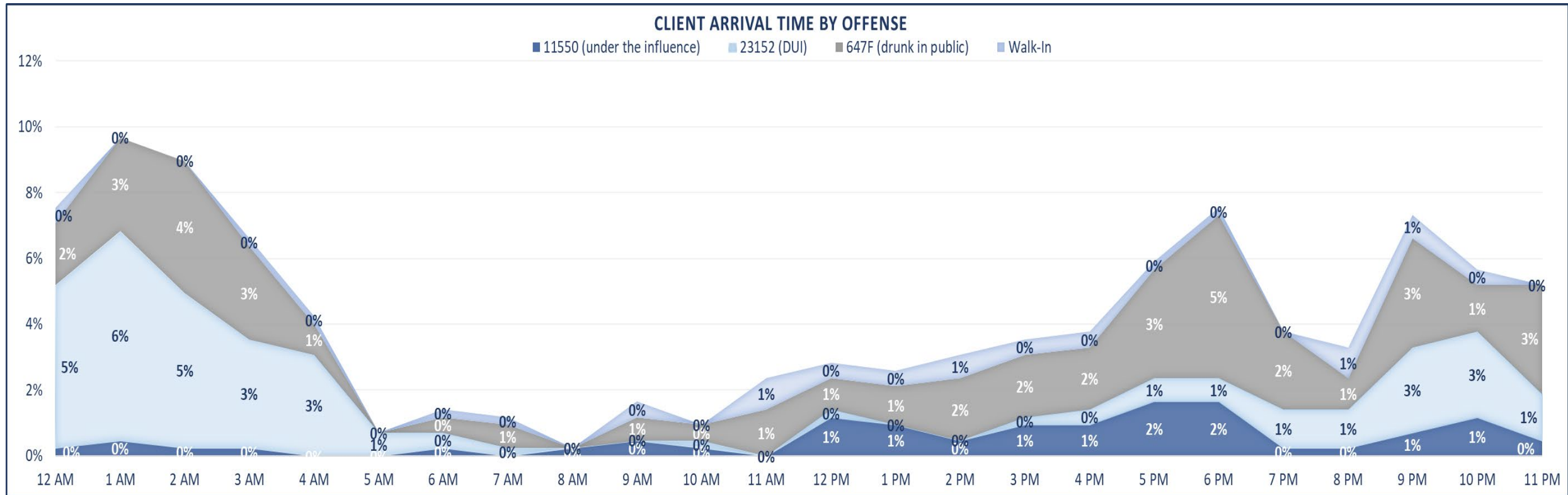
Average Daily Census by Admission Type & Weekday

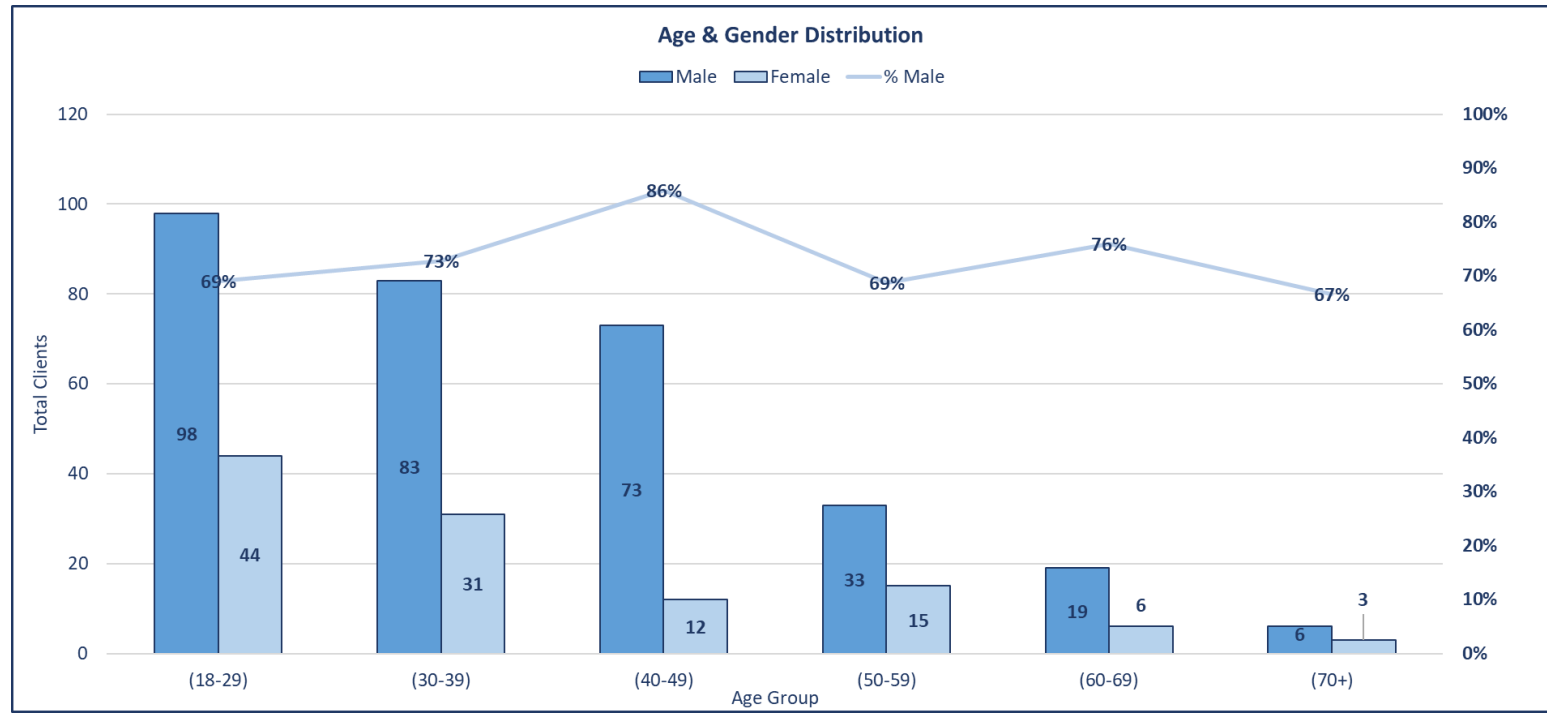
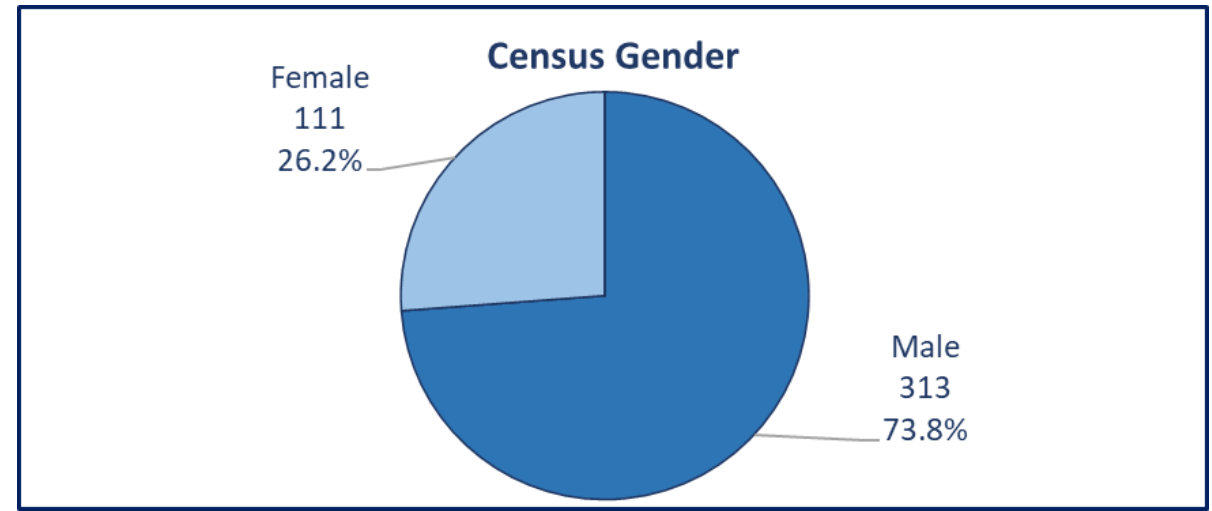
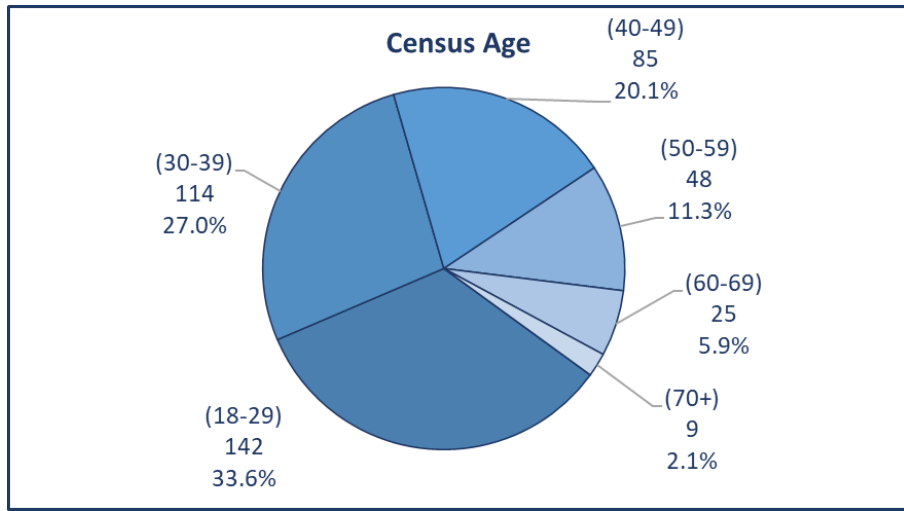

Client Arrival Time By Offense

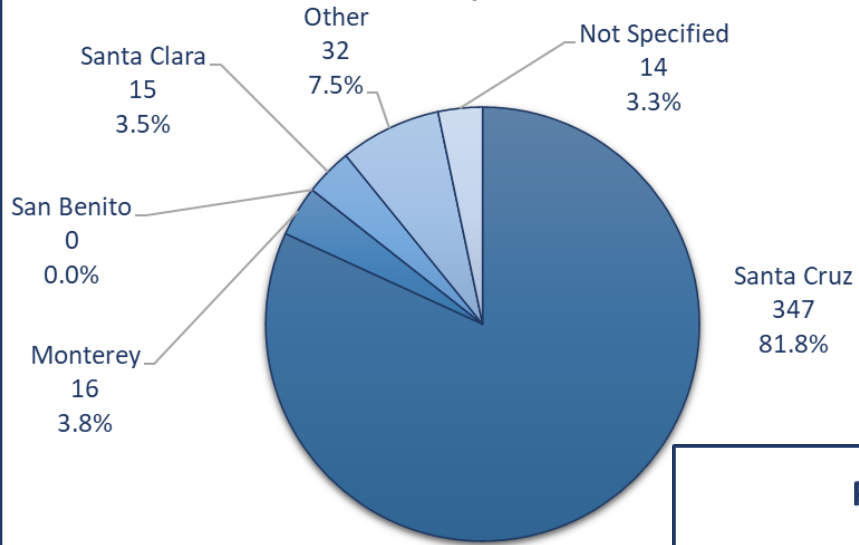


Age & Gender Distribution

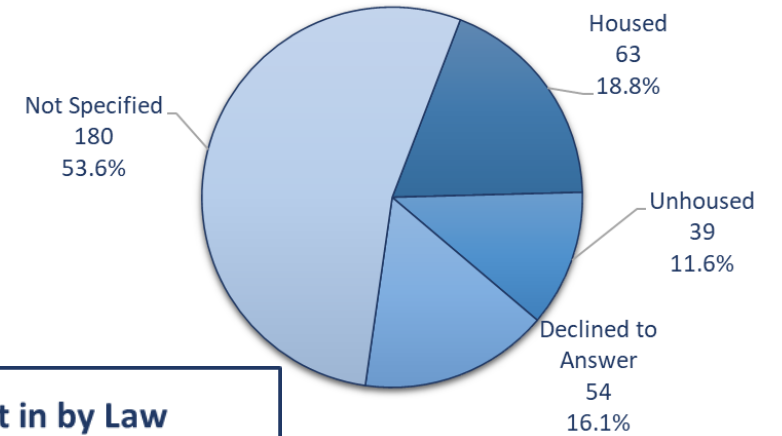

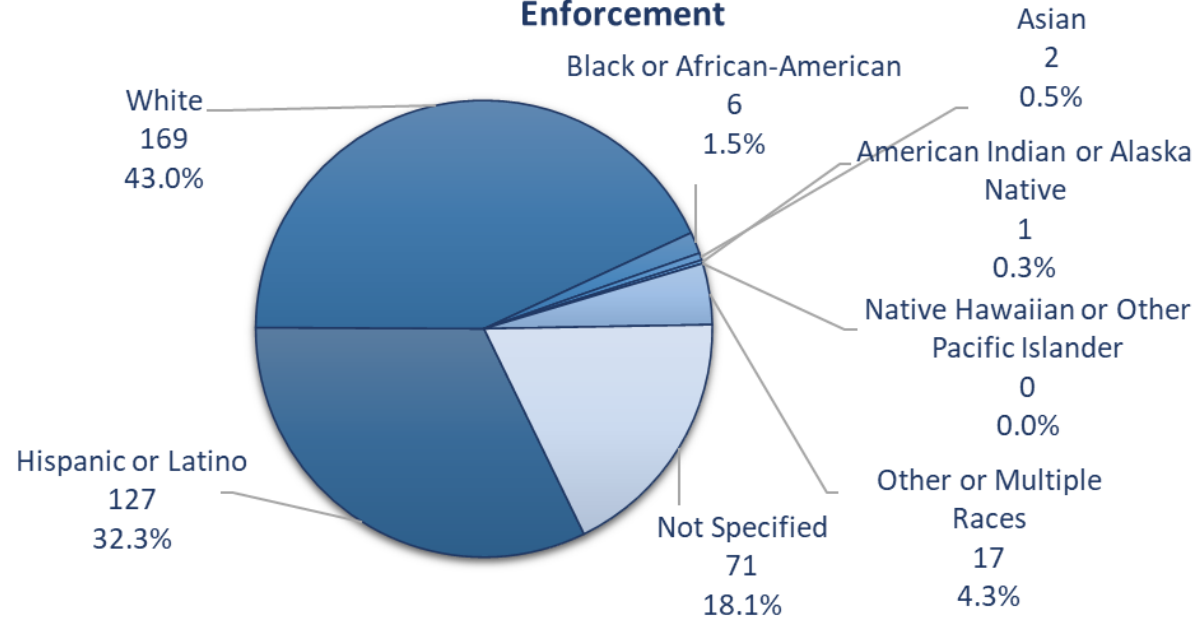

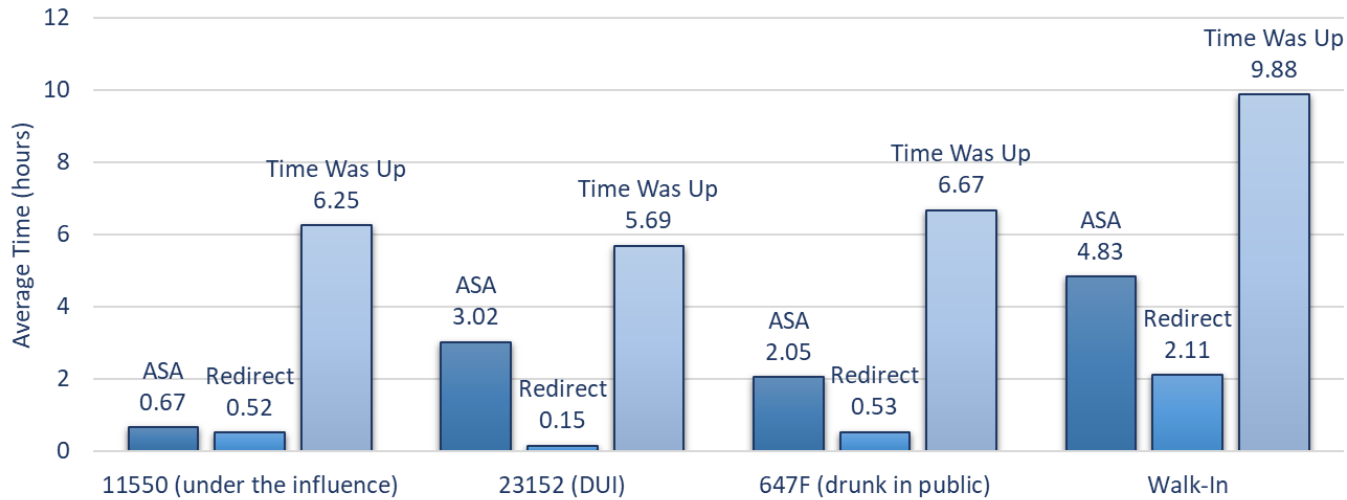


Perceived Client Race/Ethnicity of Clients Brought in by Law Enforcement

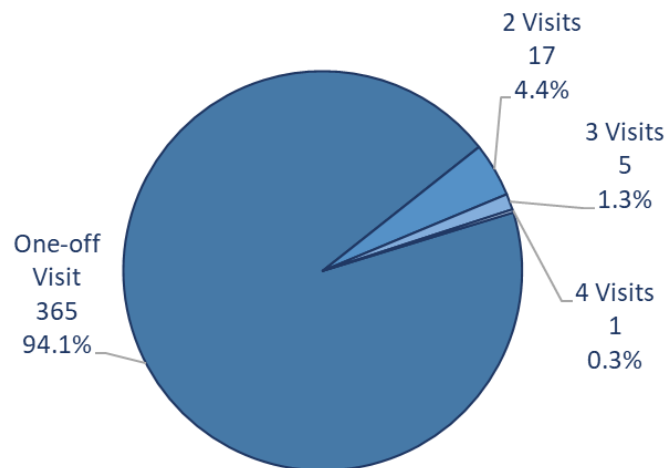


Length of Stay & Readmission Data

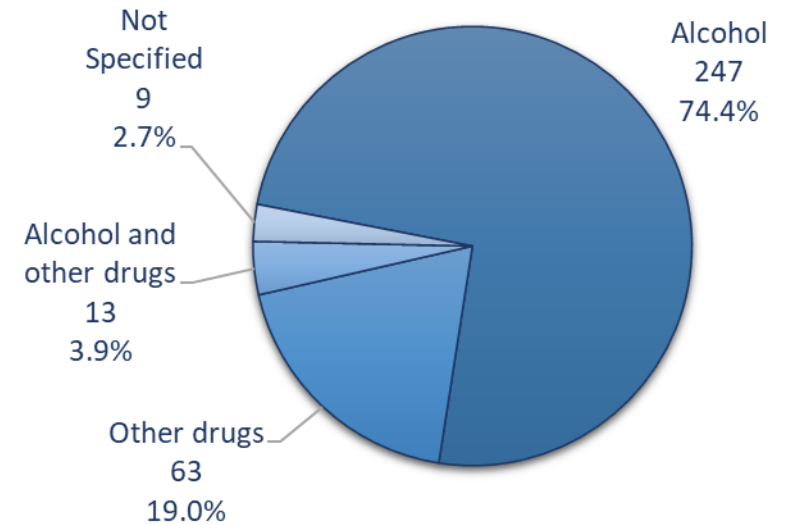
Average Client Time by Admission and Discharge Reason



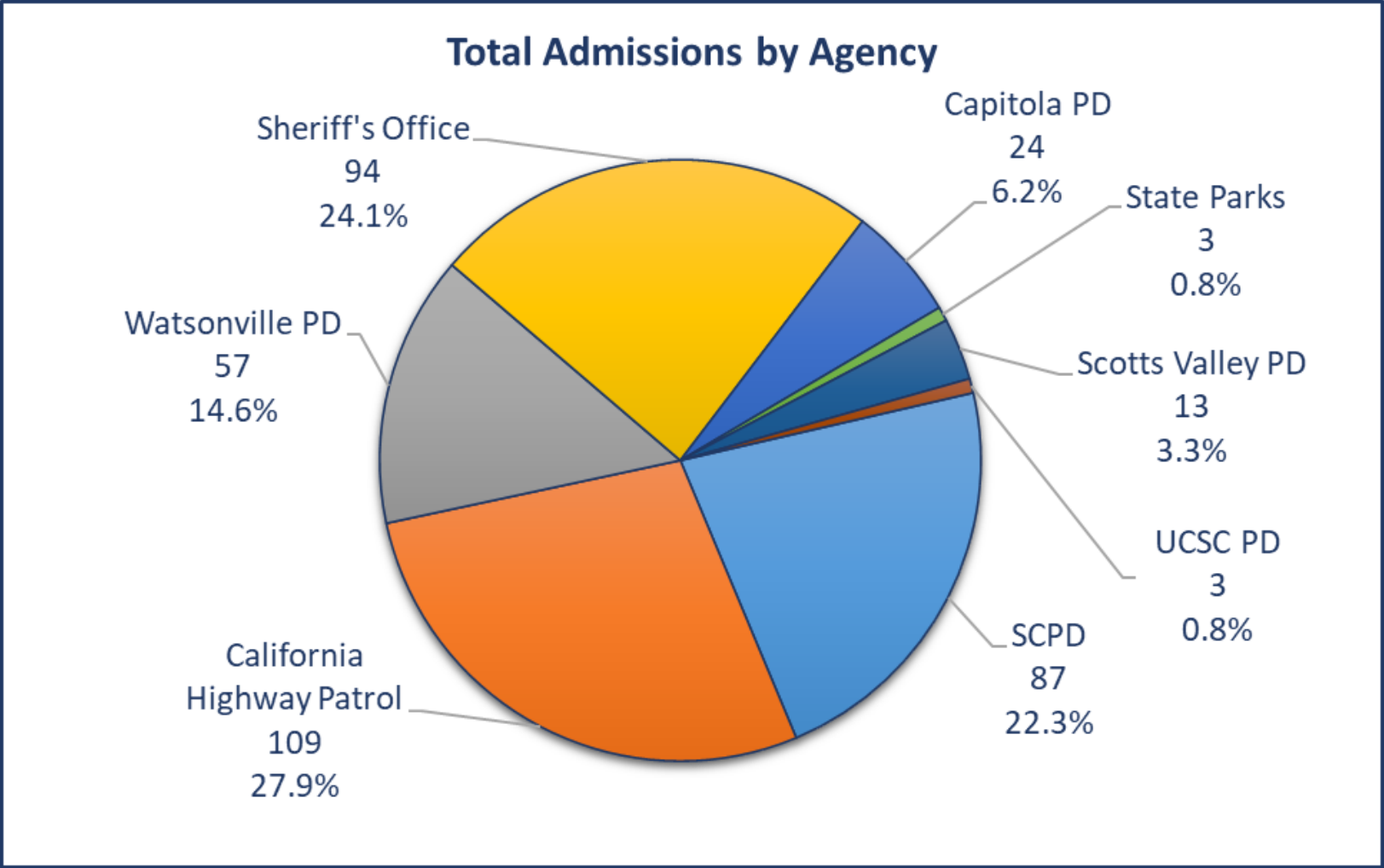
Repeat Sobering Center Clients

(for clients not immediately redirected)

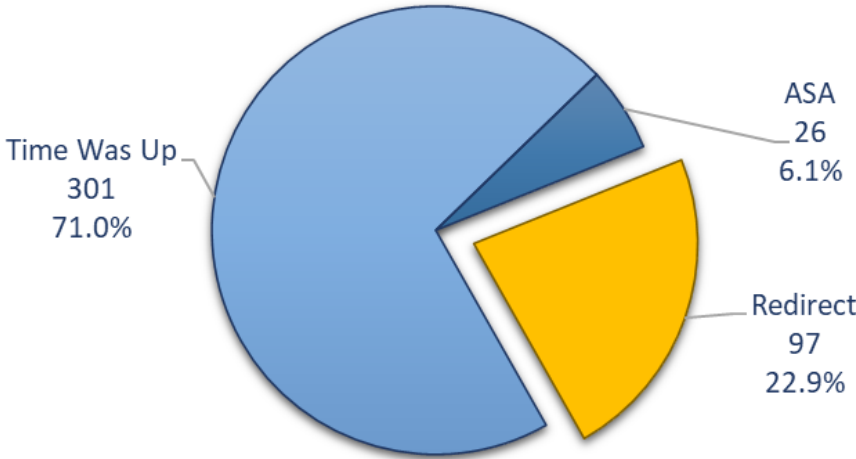


Total Admissions by Agency

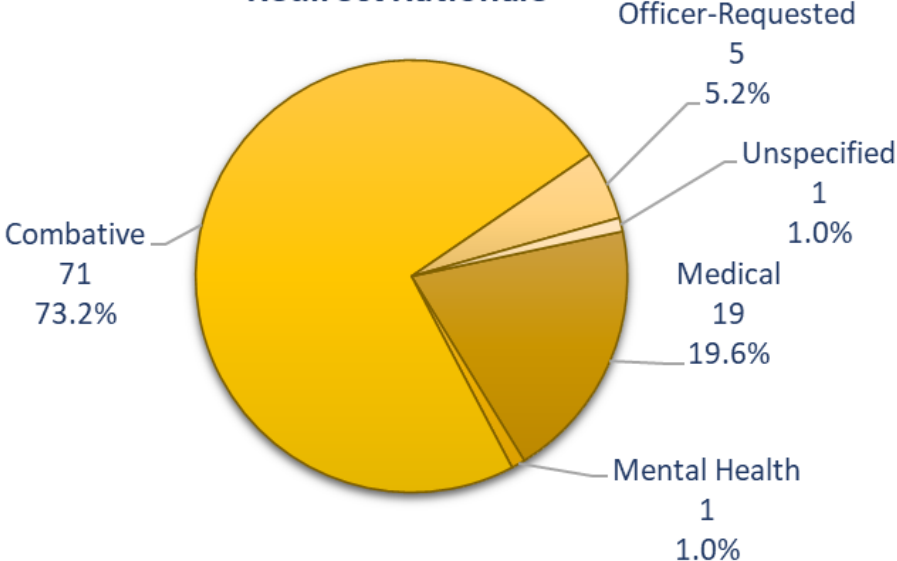


Discharge & Redirect Rationale

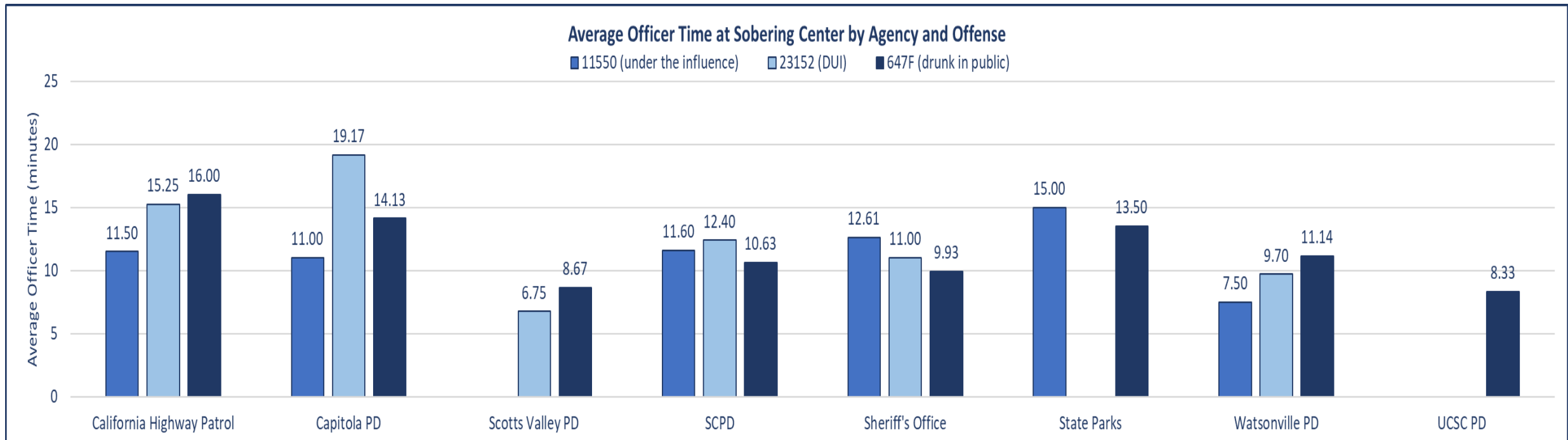
Discharge Rationale



Redirect Rationale

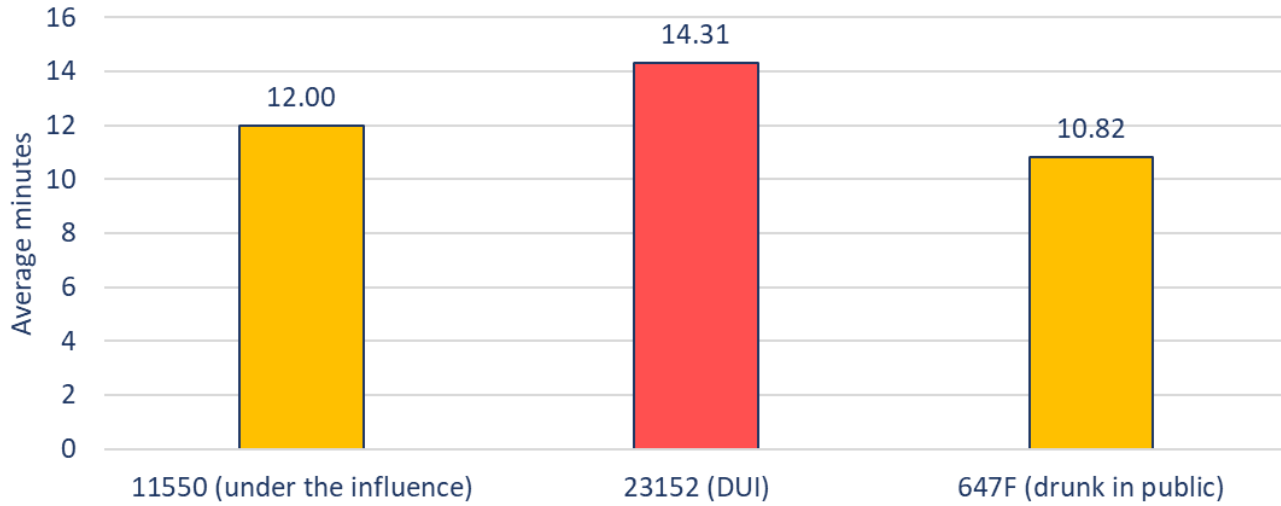


Average Officer Time Combined Offense/Agency



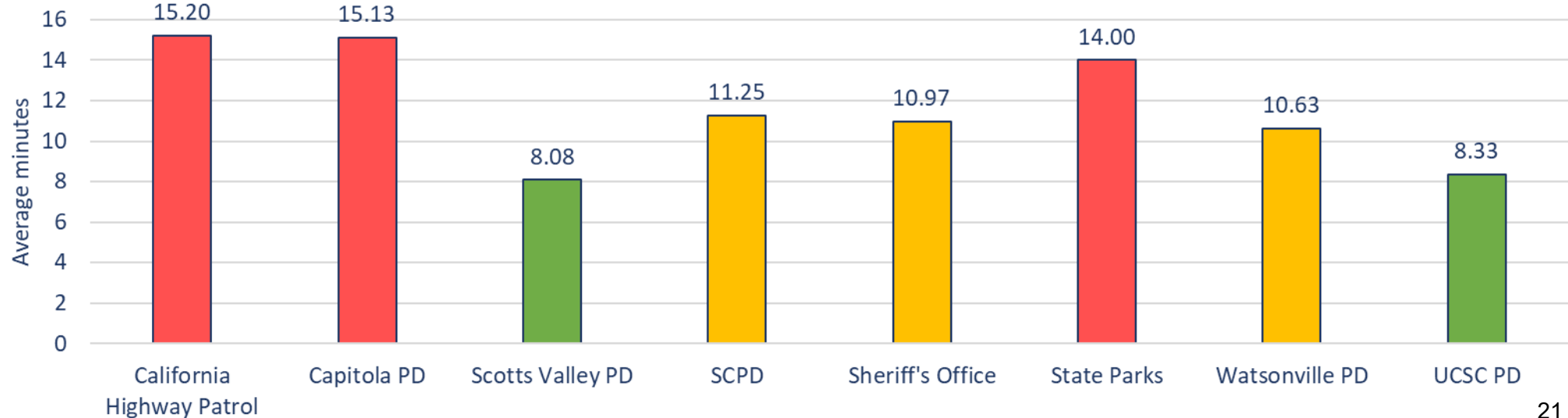
Average Officer Time by Offense & Agency

Average Officer Time at Sobering Center by Offense

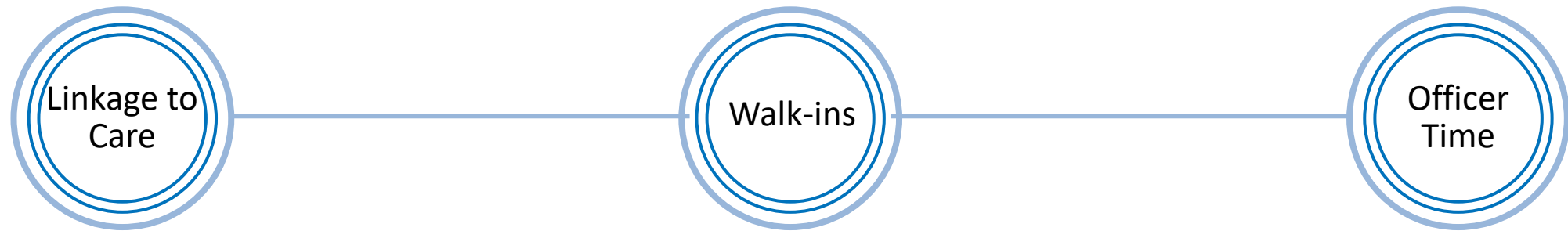

Areas of Focus



A continued focus on including this data point for referrals. We are using the multiple admit data to flag high utilizers and offer additional supports.

We have seen an increase in Walk-ins. We will focus on using these opportunities for high touch Case Management. We will also be focusing on increasing engagement with individuals being released from the jail.

Officer exit times have averaged around 12 minutes. We will focus on decreasing the average turnaround time to under 10 minutes

Medication Assisted Treatment



Medication-assisted treatment (MAT) is the use of medications in combination with counseling and behavioral therapies for the treatment of substance use disorders. For those with an opioid use disorder (OUD), medication addresses the physical difficulties that one experiences when they stop taking opioids.

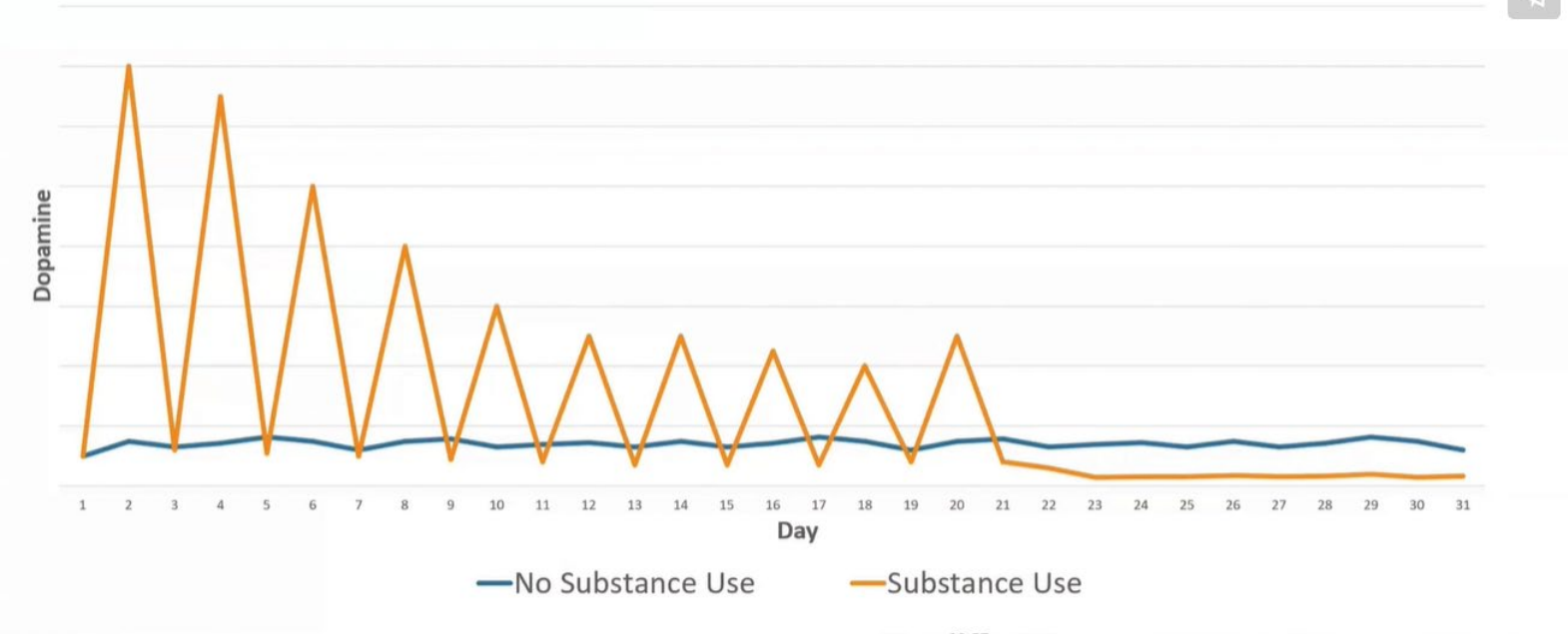

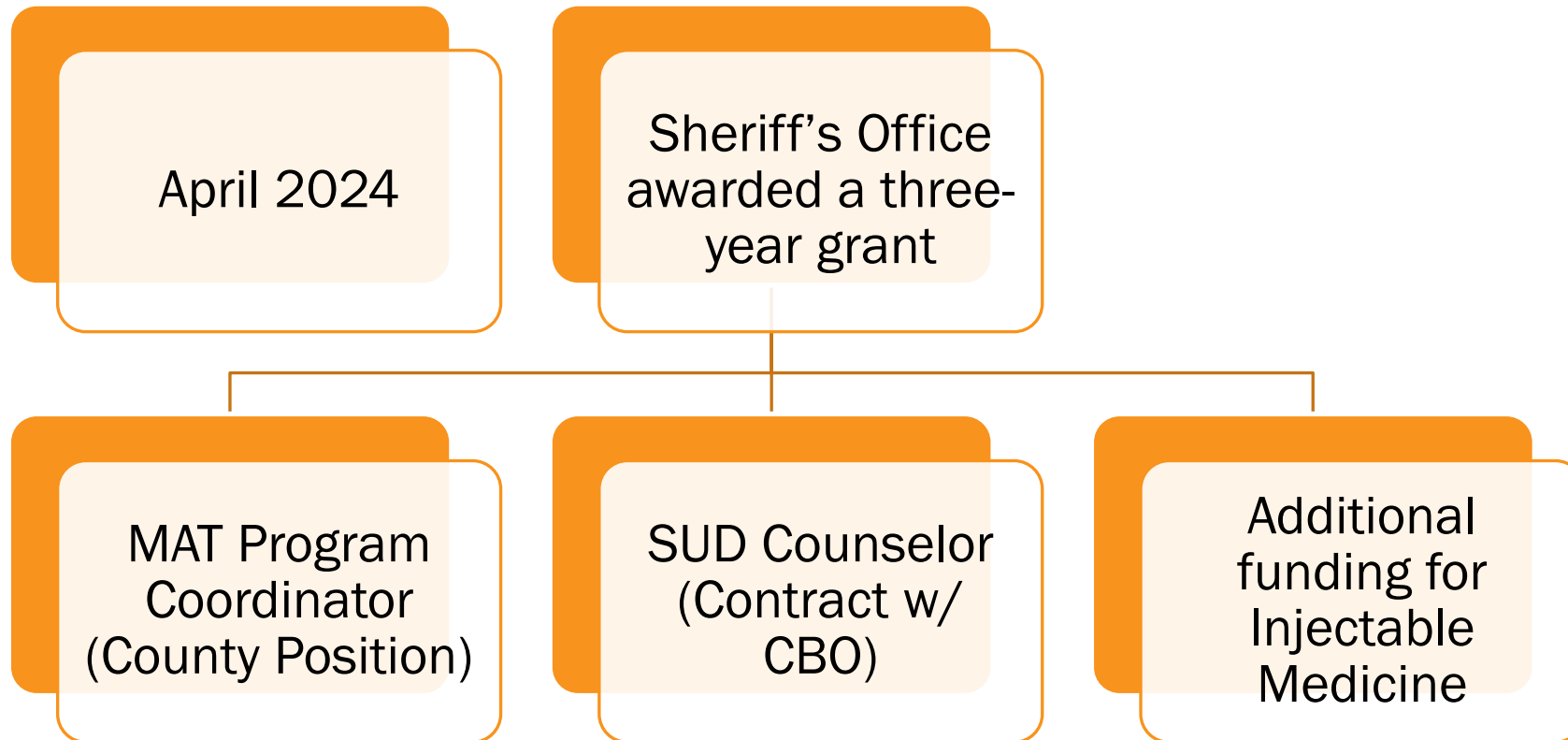
