## Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter and Santa Cruz SPCA Offer Free Adoptions

More than 150 California animal shelters offer fee-waived adoptions, with the goal to find loving homes for 5,000 pets

SANTA CRUZ, CA – June 4, 2025 — On Saturday, June 7, Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter and the Santa Cruz SPCA will join more than 150 California animal shelters in holding fee-waived adoption events as part of the second annual California Adopt-a-Pet Day. Hosted by the <u>California Animal Welfare Association</u> (CalAnimals), the <u>San Francisco Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals</u> (SF SPCA), and the <u>ASPCA</u><sup>®</sup> (The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals<sup>®</sup>), the event is designed to encourage Californians to "Shop the Shelters FIRST" when adding a pet to the family.

"Although adopting from a shelter has become <u>much</u> more common that it was 25 years ago," said Amber Rowland, General Manager of Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter, "recent research has

shown that only about 30% of households with pets got their pets from a shelter – in spite of the fact that we have a great variety of pets, and adopting generally includes well over \$600 worth of vet care to set the pet up for a long and healthy life."

**WHAT:** Santa Cruz animal shelters join those across California for the 2nd annual California Adopt-a-Pet Day to offer feewaived adoptions for available animals like these:

- <u>Tito</u>, a 24 lb, 2.5 yr old Schnoodle(?) or
- <u>Willoughby</u>, a dapper black & white shorthaired cat at the SC SPCA, or maybe
- <u>Boomer</u>, a 4 yr old, family-friendly German Shepherd, or
- Oscar, a 10 week old orange tabby kitten now at the Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter

**NOTE:** The Santa Cruz County Animal Shelter's Watsonville location (586 Airport Blvd) will be CLOSED to the public on Saturday, June 7 to fully staff this adoption event at the Santa Cruz location (1001 Rodriguez St).

**WHY:** Adopting a pet from your local animal shelter has many benefits, as shelters routinely vaccinate, spay/neuter, and microchip animals before they are adopted. As a result, adopting means families and individuals are getting a pet who has already received initial medical care that is appropriate for their species and age, and the staff at the shelter will help you find a pet who's well-matched for your lifestyle.

**MORE INFORMATION:** The inaugural California Adopt-a-Pet Day event in 2024 was a huge success, with 3,609 animals being adopted in one day across the state—far outpacing the goal of 2,024 adoptions. Event organizers have raised the bar for 2025, with a more than doubled new goal of finding loving homes for 5,000 dogs, cats, horses, and other small animals.
